STAFF OF MOI BENEFIT FROM A FREE BREAST CANCER SCREENING EXERCISE

The month of October is an annual campaign to raise awareness about Breast Cancer globally.

In view of this, the Gender and Disability Desk of the Ministry of Information with support from the Human Resource Directorate in collaboration with the Ussher Polyclinic Reproductive Unit and the Greater Accra Regional Hospital organised a Breast Cancer Awareness Talk and a free screening session for staff of the Ministry of Information.

The event was observed under the theme "Your Breast Your Pride"

The resource person for the event Mrs. Doris Adjei, who is also the head of Reproductive Health Unit at the Greater Accra Regional Hospital revealed that breast cancer was the second leading cause of death in the world.

She added that breast cancer does not only affect women but can affect men as well. According to statistics, 1% of men in the world develop breast cancer.

The resource person mentioned that the causes of breast cancer is unknown. However, there are risk factors associated with breast cancer such as Obesity, Family History, Unhealthy Eating Habits among others.

She assured staff that breast cancer can be prevented through change of lifestyle such as exercising, eating healthy meals including fruits and vegetables.

Staff were educated on how to self-screen their breasts. A total of 31 staff made up of 25 females and 6 males were screened.

MINISTRY OF INFORMATION GETS NEW BUSES

The Minister for Information, Honourable Kojo Oppong Nkrumah has handed over two new 15-seater Toyota buses to facilitate the work of the Ministry and its press pool.

Presenting the vehicles at the forecourt of the Ministry, the Minister said the buses could not have come at a better time than now as it would help ease the daily hustle staff go through in getting to and from work.

"The Ministry for some time now has been working on procuring buses to meet the transportation needs of our staff. Thankfully, we have been able to secure some resources to procure these buses. So at a primary stage, we are of the view that the Ministry can start solving some of the transportation needs of its staff with these new 15-seater buses and also assist our press pool in its work.", he announced.

He expressed gratitude to the Directors of the Ministry for their speedy execution of tasks associated with the procurement of the buses.

He was optimistic the buses would ensure journalists are ferried safely and comfortably to and from national assignments.

Hon. Oppong Nkrumah urged the Transport Unit of the Ministry to inculcate serious maintenance regimes into their operations to enable staff derive value for money.

The Minister also mentioned that plans were underway to procure two additional buses to support the work of the Ministry and improve the welfare of staff and journalists.

The Chief Director, Mrs. Mamle Andrews on her part, said that the Ministry would continue with efforts to create a conducive environment for work.

Meanwhile, two additional motorbikes for dispatch were also handed over with the vehicles to the Transport Unit of the Ministry.
